

# The European Baccalaureate cycle

the two last years of secondary education (s6 and s7)

#### a comprehensive multilingual curriculum.

combination of language, humanities and scientific subjects taught in more than one language.

the « 10% Rule » absences during S7 (justified or not) cannot exceed 10%. *Strict application of this rule.* 





# Assessment





# **General explanation**

- At the end of s7, the pupils obtain a preliminary mark (C Mark), which represents 50% of the final mark.
- The other 50 % = the BAC written and oral examinations.

• The preliminary mark (C Mark) reflects all the formative assessment and summative assessment (Pre-Baccalaureate examinations) carried out by the teachers during s7.





<u>C Mark = preliminary mark</u>

# A Mark = Daily work = 40 % of the C Mark

## B Mark = Prebac + B tests = 60 % of the C Mark

## C Mark = A Mark + B Mark





-C-mark = sum of each preliminary mark, except for religion and ethics.

- -W-mark = sum of all written marks.
- -O-mark = sum of all oral marks.

All the sums (C, W, O) are expressed in %.

-Final mark = 0,5\*C + 0,35\*W + 0,15\*O


The overall pass mark for the European Baccalaureate is **5 out 10 (50 out of 100).**

Both written and oral examinations are subject to <u>double correction</u> and marking by both the candidates' teachers and external examiners.

The final mark will be the average of the two examiners' marks.

In the case of a mark-disagreement of over two points, a third external corrector will be brought in and will establish through a thorough analysis of the previous corrections a final mark between the highest and the lowest awarded by the two previous correctors.

# Summary: 5 written and 3 oral exams

#### 5 written exams (35%)

- 1.L1 or Advanced L1 (mandatory)
- 2.L2 or Advanced L2 (mandatory)
- 3. Maths 3 or 5
- 4.A 4-period option
- 5.A 4-period option

#### 3 oral exams (15%)

- 1.L1 or Advanced L1 (mandatory)
- 2.L2 or Advanced L2 or History or Geography (2 or 4 hour) if not chosen as written examination
- 3. Advanced Maths (obligatory if taken as course) or a science (2 or 4) or Philosophy (2 or 4) or L3 or L4/ONL only if the 4-p. option has not been chosen for the written examination

- 6.5.1.2 Restrictions for compulsory subjects and for options
  - Examination 1: Language 1 or Language 1 Advanced

Candidates who have followed the advanced course will be required to sit an oral examination on that course, and not, therefore, on the basic course.

Examination 2: Language 2 or Language 2 Advanced or Geography or History

Candidates who have followed the Advanced Language 2 course and who wish to choose L2 for their second oral examination will be required to sit an oral examination on that advanced course, and not on the basic course.

The candidates who do not wish to sit an oral examination in Language 2 (basic or advanced course) will sit an oral examination in History (2 or 4 periods) or Geography (2 or 4 periods). It is possible for candidates to sit the History or Geography oral examination provided that they have not chosen to sit the subject in question as a written examination.

#### Examination 3:

Candidates who have followed the advanced course in Mathematics will be compulsorily examined on that course.

Candidates who have not followed the advanced course in Mathematics will be required to sit an examination in one of the options listed above, which they may choose freely, provided that they have not already chosen to take the subject in question as a written examination.

Candidates who choose the ONL cannot choose L4.

• <u>2-periods courses</u> cannot be presented for the written baccalaureate.

- <u>Complementary courses</u> cannot be presented either in writing or orally. (B tests only)
- If the candidate only has <u>two 4-period options</u>, he must choose these two subjects in writing.

# European Baccalaureate Diploma

#### The European Baccalaureate Diploma

□ is awarded to successful candidates by the Secretary-General of the European Schools on behalf of the Board of Governors.

Certifies the completion of secondary studies in a European School or in a School Accredited by the Board of Governors.

is officially recognised as an entry qualification for Higher Education in all the countries of the European Union, as well as in a number of others.

European Baccalaureate diploma holders enjoy the same rights and benefits as other holders of secondary school-leaving certificates in their countries... ... including the same right as nationals with equivalent qualifications to seek admission to any university or institution of tertiary education in the European Union.
